

Recipe: Beefy French Onion Potpie

Ingredients

1 lb. ground beef 1 small onion, chopped 1 can (10.5 oz.) condensed French onion soup 1.5 cups shredded part-skim mozzarella cheese 1 tube (12 oz.) buttermilk biscuits

Directions

Preheat oven to 350°. In a large skillet, cook beef and onion over medium heat 6-8 minutes or until beef is no longer pink, break-



ing beef into crumbles; drain. Stir in soup; bring to a boil.

Transfer to an ungreased 9-in. deep-dish pie plate; sprinkle with cheese. Bake 5 minutes or until cheese is melted. Top with biscuits. Bake 15-20 minutes longer or until biscuits are golden brown. * Recipe from TasteofHome.com

DANGEROUS PRODUCT ALERTS

Certain HIV Medicines May Lead to Kidney Disease

You may be eligible for compensation if you currently take or have taken any of the following medications used to treat or prevent HIV:



Truvada, Viread, Atripla, Complera, or Stribild.

Gilead Sciences, Inc. is the biotechnology company responsible for the aforementioned HIV medications, which are a form of tenofovir disoproxyl fumurate (TDF). TDF drugs are linked to severe side effects, including chronic kidney disease, bone density loss and fracturing. It is alleged that Gilead knew of the harmful side effects as early as 2001. The FDA even issued a letter to Gilead in 2002 about their marketing practices regarding TDF and its side effects, as they felt Gilead was giving misleading information.

It is also alleged that Gilead withheld the safer alternative, tenofovir alafenamide (TAF), because of the profits they were making from their TDF drugs. TAF has a lower dose of tenofovir, which reduces the risk of kidney and bone injuries.

Roundup Weed Killer Known to Cause Cancer

Weed killer, or herbicide, is available for purchase in stores all across the

country. One of the most popular products is Roundup, an herbicide containing glyphosate as its main ingredient. Roundup was originally a Monsato product, but the company was purchased by Bayer in 2018.

In May 2019, a California jury awarded a couple more than \$2 billion after they claimed the glyphosate in their Roundup weed killer caused their non-Hodgkin's lymphoma, a form of cancer. While Bayer plans to appeal the decision, there are over 13,000 cases pending against them for similar claims.


